Rediscovering Antique Kimono: the Dream of the Taisho Era -Secret Stories of Meisen Kimono-

"Meisen" sparked the antique kimono boom. It was very popular among schoolgirls from the Taisho to the early Showa period, and its many innovative colors and patterns, which are not found in modern kimonos, are very exciting and inspiring.

This exhibition introduces about 60 "meisen" selected from the collection of about 600 items by Ms. Kiryu Masako, a collector and researcher of "meisen".

Please also pay attention to the kimono coordination by Ms. Ohno Rafu, a kimono stylist. Girl's History through "Meisen".

The culture of schoolgirls 100 years ago was a series of new things and a history of modest struggles. It was a time when Western culture and ways of thinking flowed into traditional Japanese values. Through "meisen", we will shed light on the culture of young women born during this transitional period.
